

Introduction to the situation in Denmark

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Regulation

- 1. EU citizens can stay up to 3 months (6 months if seeking a job) in Denmark.**

- 2. EU citizens can stay longer, if they:**
 - Have a salaried work, are self-employed, offer services.**
 - Are pensioned.**
 - Are stationed.**
 - Are students.**
 - Can support themselves.**

Regulation

- 3. Nordic citizens are free to live and work in Denmark .**
- 4. Family reunification is possible under certain circumstances.**
